



PROGRAM ACTIVITIES



The new online Alternative Fuel Vehicles course, available at no cost to Kansas firefighters. As a self-paced online course, it can be completed in the comfort of your home and on your schedule via the University of Kansas online training system. Contact the Institute for registration information.

New Course: Online Alternative Fuel Vehicles Course

Early in FY 2015, the Institute was approached by the Metropolitan Energy Center (MEC) in Kansas City to assist with developing an Alternative Fuel Vehicles (AFV) course. Comprised of two sections, the first section overviews the safety aspects of alternative fuel vehicle incidents and is targeted to all emergency responders. The second section addresses response issues when responding to incidents involving Alternative Fuel Vehicles and is specifically targeted to firefighters. The online course is self-paced and all-inclusive.

The Institute also offers this course in a traditional face-toface format that can be taught in local fire departments. To participate in the online AFV course, visit kupce.ku.edu/kufirehome and search the Firefighter Programs listings for this course.

Certification Courses Revised

Many of the KFRTI courses that lead to national certification have either been revised or are in the process of revision. These revisions happen periodically as new editions of the NFPA National Standards are published. Accreditation criteria requires the Institute to update materials to meet the latest edition of the applicable national standard within two years of the standard's publication date.

Within the past year the Institute has revised the Fire Officer I, Fire Inspector I, Driver/Operator Pumper & Aerial, Hazardous Materials Awareness & Operations (See Online Hazardous Materials Courses article below). Scheduled for revision in 2018 are Fire Fighter I & II, Confined Space Entry and Rope Rescue I & II.

Coming Soon: Online Hazardous Materials Courses

The Institute is developing a new Online Hazardous Materials Awareness course. This new course is being developed to meet the new NFPA Professional Qualifications Standard for Hazardous Materials/ Weapons of Mass Destruction Emergency Response. This new standard is a redevelopment of the old "472" standard written in the Professional Qualifications Standard format.

The new online course will be a self-paced, one part course. Upon completion, individuals may take the national certification exam or skip that subject within the Firefighter I course offered by the Institute. This new course is projected for completion by the summer of 2018.

An online course for Hazardous Materials Operations is being evaluated for development in 2018/19. The course will be a two-part course similar to the Introduction to Technical Rescue course currently offered by the Institute. Part I will be an online, self-paced course covering the knowledge components of the curriculum. Part II will be a face-to-face course covering the hands-on skills elements required by the national standard.

Review of Certification Based Programs Underway

The Institute began a review of all "certification based courses" in the summer of 2017. This review will continue into 2018 and is being conducted with the specific goal of increasing the success of firefighters participating in these courses.

As national standards are revised on a routine schedule, the performance requirements continue to increase. Both knowledge and skills required by the standards include new expectations placed on firefighters and related emergency responders. The amount of information in the courses expand in direct correlation to the standards.

The purpose of this review is to ensure that courses include up-to-date knowledge and skills training to meet the standards; old, unnecessary content is removed; and appropriate learning activities and technologies

are used to help prepare the students for the national certification exam administered at the end of the course.

Preliminary results of this review indicate that a number of improvements will help the student success rate. These modifications include:

An introductory lesson in each course describing:

- Course design, national standard requirements and the relationship between the standard and the course content.
- An explanation of the roles and responsibilities of instructors, students, Institute staff and fire department officers involved in the course.

• Improvements in the design of the courses to ensure student involvement in the course and engagement with the course information.

Instructor Professional Development Seminars beginning in the spring of 2018 designed to help implement these improvements.

• All instructors involved in training firefighters in Kansas will be invited to attend these no cost seminars.

Revision of all National Certification Guides (formerly titled Certification Study Guides).

Improvements in certification test bank management.

- A thorough review of all test questions to ensure they test what is required and are fair and unbiased.
- A new test management software will be purchased
 – with new capabilities in:
 - Detailed student test results reports detailing results by subject matter,
 - Detailed reports for instructors on how their students did on the exam (no student names will be provided, just scores and statistics for the group)
 - Automatic test question selection - random question selection based on Job Performance Requirements (JPR) and/ or objectives to be tested.

GRANT ACTIVITIES

The Institute continues to seek grants as opportunities present themselves. We have been fortunate over the last four years in supplementing the budget with a total of over \$1.16 million dollars in Assistance to Firefighters Grants and \$190,000 in miscellaneous grants. All of these grants were awarded for specific projects or to support specific training courses as explained in the narratives listed below.

Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG)

The Institute has been fortunate to receive grant support from the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) program. This grant program is a competitive grant that, if awarded, can be used by designated state fire training agencies to purchase equipment, firefighter protective clothing, or vehicles (limited to firefighting vehicles or tow vehicles). Over the last four years the Institute has received \$1,163,320 in federal awards from the AFG program. These grants have allowed us to accelerate the repair of two props and purchase two new props (a driving simulator and a mobile training tower).

Due to the competitive nature of these grants, awards are not guaranteed. The Institute will maintain our current fiscal plan related to funding new props and the refurbishment of older props within our existing abilities. If additional grants are awarded, the Institute will take advantage of the opportunities to make additional improvements in firefighter training programs and resources.

2016 AFG Awarded: Refurbish of Flammable Liquids and Gases Training Simulator

In the spring of 2017 the Institute was awarded a new Assistance to Firefighters Grant to refurbish the Flammable Liquids and Gases Training Simulator (typically



referred to as the Propane Trailer). This grant was awarded in the last half of FY 2017; therefore, the actual refurbishment will take place in FY 2018.

Time has taken its toll on the simulator since delivery in 2009 and it is in need of multiple repairs to bring it back to full capabilities. Specifications were developed and a contract awarded for the work. As this report is written, the unit is in Ohio being refurbished. Work is expected to be completed in March 2018.

2015 AFG Funded Training Tower & Semi-Tractor

The Institute took delivery of a new Freightliner Business Class Semi Tractor mid-summer of 2017. A little over a month later, a new 36' Mobile Training Tower was delivered. The tower is built on a semi-trailer frame and is raised/lowered with hydraulic rams. Equipped with "bomb proof" anchor points for rope rescue training, a standpipe system, windows at three internal floors and a flat deck on top, the tower is designed to support a wide variety of training, including rope rescue, ground ladders, aerial ladder operations, firefighting in



multi-level structures and a host of other topics.

Delivered in July 2017, the new Mobile Training Tower is in service and assisting in the delivery of valuable training.

KDEM HMEP Training Sub-Grant

The Kansas Division of Emergency Management through the federal Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) grant program awarded the Institute a grant to support hazardous materials-related training at the Institute. This \$25,000 sub-grant supports delivery of training in Hazardous Materials Operations, Responding to Ethanol Incidents, Responding to Chlorine and Anhydrous Ammonia Incidents, Alternative Fuel Vehicle, Handling Propane Emergencies, and Hazardous Materials on Scene Commander.

NFA State Training Systems Grant

The Institute also received a \$20,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's National Fire Academy that funds the delivery of a specific list of National Fire Academy courses in Kansas. The Institute has received financial assistance through this grant since 2009.

Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Grant

Working with the Kansas Department of Transportation, we secured a \$60,000 grant to support the delivery of Traffic Incident Management training to all Kansas first responders for two years. The Institute manages training delivery for this program; however,

the success of this program has been accomplished through a partnership with KDOT, the Highway Patrol, and many other fire, law and EMS organizations. The goal of this program is to reduce the number of emergency responder injuries and deaths while operating at incidents on the highways and roadways. Although limited to this specific subject matter, the funding helps support our programs while providing lifesaving training for Kansas firefighters, police officers, emergency medical technicians and other responders to traffic incidents. The efforts of our partnership have increased the number of Kansas first responders trained in this subject significantly. While it is hard to document prevention of injuries and deaths, the Federal Highway

Administration recently praised the Kansas program for improvements in training responders through this important course.

Since the program began in March of 2017 this program has delivered 48 TIM courses training 984 emergency responders. Within these

numbers we have conducted 26 train-the-trainer sessions training 122 instructors. To request a Traffic

The Institute has invested over 3.5 million dollars over the last 14 years to purchase props and other dedicated training resources to improve firefighter training in Kansas. These resources include:

These props and support units include Semi-trailers and Bumper hitch trailers, as well as a significant amount of equipment that is housed in the units. The tow vehicles are dedicated tow vehicles used to transport props and support units to training locations throughout Kansas.

NEW LEARNING MANGEMENT SYSTEM (LMS) IMPLEMENTED

KU Professional & Continuing Education (our parent organization) implemented a new learning management system in June 2017. This system includes many new and improved capabilities. Some of the new features include an online registration system, the ability to print your own certificates, the ability to print an "unofficial" transcript of training and the ability to pay fees on line (for those few times the Institute charges a fee).

To maximize the benefits of this system, all participating students need to log in to the new system and create a personal profile. That profile allows you access to view records and print certificates (and/ or duplicate certificates if yours has been lost). By creating a profile, you also give us critical information and assistance in making sure you get the most benefit from the system. Your email address is the key (think critical) link in the process. The system uses your unique email address to identify you, so it is very important that you remember to update your profile (email address) when changes occur. This will ensure that you get registration confirmations, notification that your certificate is ready to print and special notifications related to your participation in the KFRTI and Professional & Continuing Education courses and activities. The new LMS

does not include records before June 22, 2017. Contact KFRTI if you have questions or need information prior to June 2017.

If you have not created a personal profile in the new system since July 2017 please visit the KFRTI website and click on the See Available Courses link (about 1/2 way down the page). In the blue box on the top, left side of the page, click the "Create Profile/Sign In" link and follow the directions. When completing the profile, please complete all blanks that apply. Leaving the Organization – Dept. name blank, for example, creates problems tracking individuals (there are a lot of Jim Smiths out there). We look forward to serving you with this new resource.

The Institute's financial status remains stable and healthy. This stability is due to the conservative fiscal philosophy maintained by the Institute. In the early years of receiving Fire Insurance Premium Tax funds, programs were rapidly expanded from 76 total deliveries in FY 2002 to over 500 programs in FY 2006. Since that time, the number of programs/courses has stabilized at approximately 500 through FY 2017. Program growth has been constrained by the limited growth of our fiscal resources. All expansion of programs has been carefully planned to remain within our ability to fund them over the long-term. Fire Insurance Tax funds have not grown as originally estimated in 2004.

FISCAL MATTERS

Although the number of training programs delivered has stabilized, expenses associated with delivering services have continued to rise. Mileage, meal and lodging reimbursement rates, turnpike tolls, and other costs associated with travel have all increased. The cost of goods and services required for operations has also increased. Some of the basic firefighter courses continue to lengthen due to expanding content required by the national standards. None of these single factors have increased the costs substantially; however, the cumulative effect of these increases, combined with limited growth in Fire Insurance Premium Tax funding, restrain our ability to grow programs to meet the ever-expanding training needs of the Kansas fire service.

Careful management of our resources has allowed continued firefighter training without having to limit the number of events provided. Conservative budget management will continue to be the guiding principle. The Institute has need for facilities to store and maintain equipment and vehicles. All equipment and vehicles are stored at the University Motor Pool in an unsecured parking lot. Maintenance must be performed in the open elements. Institute office space is full with no room for expansion as our program grows in the future. Equipment storage and housing is the most critical need. Storing over three million dollars of equipment and vehicles in the open environment subjects that equipment to damage

from exposure to extremes of temperature, sunlight, hail and related deterioration. These needs remain unfunded.


Operating Budget (State & KU funding)

The Institute's primary funding is provided through KSA 75-1508 that provides .20 of the 1.25% tax on Fire Insurance Premiums. In FY 2017 the Institute received \$1,288,475 from this source. The University provided \$188,397 in support of our mission. These funds provided a total operating budget of \$1,476,872.

At the end of FY 2016 the Institute was notified of a \$70,000 budget cut from KU funding for FY 2017. That reduction is reflected in the previous paragraph. KU funding was reduced an additional \$16,000 for FY 2018. KU has suffered a number of budget cuts over the past few years. Operating expenses totaled \$1,247,306 in FY 2017. Operating expenses do not include equipment purchase or expenses related to program improvements. Equipment and program improvement expenses are funded from carry-forward funds accumulated from previous years. This practice is required due to the cost for props and equipment which typically range from \$200,000 to over \$400,000. These purchases cannot be made from our operating budget and require us to save carryforward funds from multiple years before making individual prop purchases. Purchases referred to in this section include refurbishing/repairing props as they age in order to extend their serviceable life. The cost for refurbishing a props is approximately ½ of the cost of a new prop. A current example is the Institute's Flammable Liquids and Gases trailer. That trailer is being refurbished as this report

is being written. The contracted cost of this refurbishment is \$204,000. Replacement cost of this unit is approximately \$500,000. The Institute received a grant for this expense, but this grant is a competitive grant and cannot be counted on for the expenses in the future.

The conservative fiscal policies of the Institute have allowed for the uninterrupted delivery of training to the 650 fire departments and 16,500+ firefighters in Kansas. The Institute has also made many improvements in the training infrastructure needed for a realistic and high-quality training experience for our firefighters. Future fiscal constraints will require continuing our conservative budget management practices. Program expansion and improvements will be affected first should the current budget environment continue into the future. The Institute will continue to keep delivering training to firefighters as our first priority.


